## 2003

100 years ago it was recorded that Ed Kenning made his first trip to Lake Wah Wash Kesh (*it was called Deer Lake at the time*). This gave the current day Members of Morton's Point Camp a 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary to celebrate.



Bud Lutman had finished his term as Treasurer in October 2002 but stayed on to assist Vic Kinsella in his taking over of the position and was assigned as co-signer for cheques. Bud took care of the December 2002 year end statement and income tax return. The ING account was transferred to Vic Kinsella and Bud Lutman took over as co-signer from Fred Isaacs. Bud Lutman was appointed assistant to the treasurer for 2003. Bud also took care of the refiling of the 2001 income tax as the Revenue Department lost our first one.

In March 2003, Danny Villeneuve declined his membership for 2003 due to his holiday schedule He did attend part of a Camp in 2003 as a guest. Ed Urbaniak had sent in a letter of resignation but later withdrew it and continued as a Member.

Our Insurance Broker was changed to Frank Galvin Insurance in Hamilton and was handled by the Secretary, Tim Inkster. Premiums for all insurance companies had increased 25% for 2003 due to the losses in investments they held in 2002. The lowest bid to copy the previous policy was \$4,701.24. In 2002 the premium was \$3,850.00 . It was found that even though we were paying premiums on all our boats and motors in the past that we did not have liability insurance for any boat over 16 feet in length with a motor over 9.9 hp. Many of the items insured by the Camp had a value below the deductible portion of the policy. A decision was made to drop coverages on all boats and motors which reduced the payment \$1,775.52 . Building coverages were increased to current rebuilding amounts.

Bill Gracey became a Grandfather in 2003 and congratulations was sent by the Secretary on behalf of the membership. Dennis Pettit got a third grandchild. Vic Kinsella had a kidney removed successfully on April 9<sup>th</sup> 2003. His son Tom had a stroke early in 2003 and responded to treatment. John Gillies father passed away in April 2003.

The brown propane fridge in the kitchen (in picture right) had acted up during the 2002 season and the repairs done were unsuccessful

for the fall Camps. A new propane fridge was purchased at the Toronto Cottage Life Show by Rob Haddow and Tim Inkster for \$4,025.00 (less \$40.25 VISA dividend credit). A 14.5 cu. ft. Crystal Cold JC 15. A \$40.25 cheque was given back to the Camp by Tim Inkster for the dividend points credited to his VISA account for the purchase of the fridge bringing the final cost of the fridge to \$3,984.75. Estimates for the fridge replacement, for the JC 15, including taxes had ranged from a high of \$5,093.35 to the final price paid. A considerable savings for 5 months of investigation. Glen Noble had found a smaller cu. ft. unit for \$4,111.25 but it did not meet our needs. Glen got the price from Sun Volts Unlimited who were the people we bought from at the Cottage Show after many e-mails. It was set to go to Camp with Rob Haddow and gang in May 2003. The CO detector kept faulting and Steve Nyitray picked up a new replacement unit at Sunvolts in Parry Sound when heading into June Camp.

The Spring Board of Directors Meeting was held on April 27th, 2003 at the home of President, Dennis Pettit, in order to save the \$130.00 cost of renting a meeting room in Sarnia at the Village Inn. Every penny was being looked at for the 2003 season with the heavy maintenance & purchase expenditures from the past three years (over \$16,000.00) and \$300.00 in assessments to help cover them. The used secondary kitchen fridge bought in late 2002 for \$500.00 and the new fridge being purchased for 2003 would take another chunk out of the wallet, followed by anticipated purchases of two new 10 cubic foot fridges (\$1,600.00 each) for the bar next year and the possible need for new outboard motors for the Pussy Kat and Crest Jon boat in the near future. The amount of money spent repairing the Hyah-Hyah in 2002 was very high and the expenditure did not get her running on lake for more than 7 days. The AGM was set for October 26, 2003.

The Pussy Kat had been taken out of the water and to Dunchurch Marine for a good servicing over the winter. Steve Nyitray had the boat returned to the lake in time for the Haddow work camp in May. What a difference a good tune up made, she was next to new again and the 48 hp ran smooth as silk. In July, the spark control box went out on the Pussy Kat motor and the boat was taken to the Marina for repairs. Parts were very long in coming and the boat was off the lake for many weeks. The Crestliner and three small motors were next in at the Marina for service. Larry Ancypa picked the boat & motors up and brought them back to the lake with Pete Roth's trailer.

The Haddow 2 day Spring Work Camp got supplies to Camp, the new fridge to Camp, the new mattress & box springs to Camp, the mouse & bat crap cleaned up, the fridges moved around and set up the new one. The brown fridge was set up as a bar fridge and was tested by the next few Camps. Unfortunately the brown fridge

did not work out as hoped and was replaced by a unit purchased on the lake in July 2003 from Andy Vurma for \$500.00. Kenny Hayward was asked to pick up the fridge from the Vurma's and install it in Camp which he did in August. This unit replaced one of the 7.8 cubic foot units which was put into the boathouse waiting for a decision from the AGM as to what to do with it.

The toilet base and seals had crumbled over the years and it gave out on the first use. We blamed the guest, Jim Keast, for taking a heavy dump and destroying our pride and joy!! A new toilet was purchased in Sundridge and installed by Tim Inkster. With new bolts, seal, spare seal and a propane cylinder the bill was \$131.06. The old toilet seat was in poor shape so a new seat stored in the bathroom was used. Unfortunately it was bright pink!!!! Not the colour for a fishing camp!!! This seat was later replaced with a basic white unit donated by the Thorup Camp along with a new Canadian flag. The 4 new Simmons mattress & box spring sets purchased through Al Glover were set up on frames and the oldest mattresses and wooden frames were disposed of. A third bed was set up on the second floor of the main lodge using the best wooden frame and a foam mattress from the bin. Now Camp had 2 beds in the Pulling Cabin, 2 beds in the Kenogan Cabin, 6 beds in the Main Sleeping Cabin, 3 beds in the main lodge, a davenport on the porch of the main lodge, 6 beds in the Boathouse and 4 beds in the Cook's Cabin. 24 beds in all with the Camp maximum set at 21. The Haddow Spring Camp started on May 16<sup>th</sup> after 2 long days of sweat & toil.

Doug Redcap did not respond to any correspondences from Tim Inkster, the Secretary, and his Membership was terminated for non payment of dues on June 1, 2003. He did submit a letter of resignation on June 13<sup>th</sup>, 2003 and his termination was reversed so he could attend Camp as a guest.

Kenny Hayward noticed water coming out of the starboard pontoon on the Pontoon II when he was getting it to the water in May and tried to repair it. It was found sinking at our dock after sitting overnight and had to be rushed to Kenny's beach where it could sink to the sand in shallow water. He had not repaired it by the time Steve Nyitray got to Camp in June and it was still sunk at his beach. Ned Riley's Camp got the boat back but the repair failed again, so back to Kenny it went. Third time lucky, the craft stayed afloat for the rest of the season.

Nathan Schonier and friends had a great week in Camp except for the poor state of cleanliness when they arrived and due to Orlyn Lewis getting ill in Camp. He had to be taken out of Camp mid week with chest pains and he flew home early. It turned out to be pulled ligaments from an earlier car accident in January.

Steve Nyitray was to be the last Camp of the season, October 3<sup>rd</sup> to the 5<sup>th</sup>. His daughter and some other Girl Guides used the time to earn credits. Al Glover took advantage of the great weather supplied by our Indian Summer and spent a few days in Camp from the Wednesday after Steve left.

The 44<sup>th</sup> Annual General Meeting was held at The Village Inn, Sarnia on October 26<sup>th</sup>, 2003. Finances were improving but still fell short of the comfort zone we have had in the past. Due to this, the new motor was not purchased for the Pussy Kat. Costs for

repairs and restoration of the Hyah-Hyah had been adding up over the past few years and in 2003 it was not supposed to cost over \$100.00 to keep her going but by the end of the season \$1,300.00 had been spent on her and an additional \$1,000.00 was being sought to repair the steering system which broke in the fall. A vote was taken at the meeting and the Hyah-Hyah was retired. It will be sold to recuperate some of the money spent on keeping her going. The club approved the purchase of two (2) used, deep V hull aluminum fishing boats with a minimum length of 16 feet. Derek Stratelak was given a \$1,500.00 US budget to purchase two boats with. He, Pete Roth and Larry Ancypa will get the boats to Camp in the Spring. Insurance rates had jumped 19% at renewal time to \$3,490.56. That makes it a 44% increase over 2 years.

Estimates were needed to repair the logs on the main lodge by the kitchen and bar area as well as the shower building to get it working. Dennis Pettit was put in charge of getting the estimates. Tim Inkster was given the task of getting information and costs to replace all the propane gas lines and include shut off valves at all appliances in the main lodge and bring the information to the 2004 Annual General Meeting.

No assessments were made against the Members but yearly dues increased \$40.00 to \$300.00 per year. Extra man days rate for Members remained the same but Guest and Relative man days rates increased \$8.00 / day in off season and Summer Camps. In the past, Members were able to submit their dues after March 31<sup>st</sup> by paying a late fee of \$50.00 per month up until June 1<sup>st</sup>. This practice was stopped by vote at the 2003 Annual General Meeting partially to remove the headaches of

collecting and to increase cash flow at Camp opening time. Now Members must be paid in full by the March 31st deadline. Ned Riley and Dennis Pettit finished their 3 year term on the Board of Directors. Rob Haddow was elected to the President position and Mark Farmer to the Vice President Position.

Derek Stratelak was authorized to purchase 2 used 16' or larger deep V aluminum boats with a budget of \$1,500.00 US. The first boat he came across (in December 2003) was a 16 foot 1991 Grumman which came with a trailer at an offered price of \$1,400.00 US. The 16' 1991 Grumman. Picture taken at sellers home.








